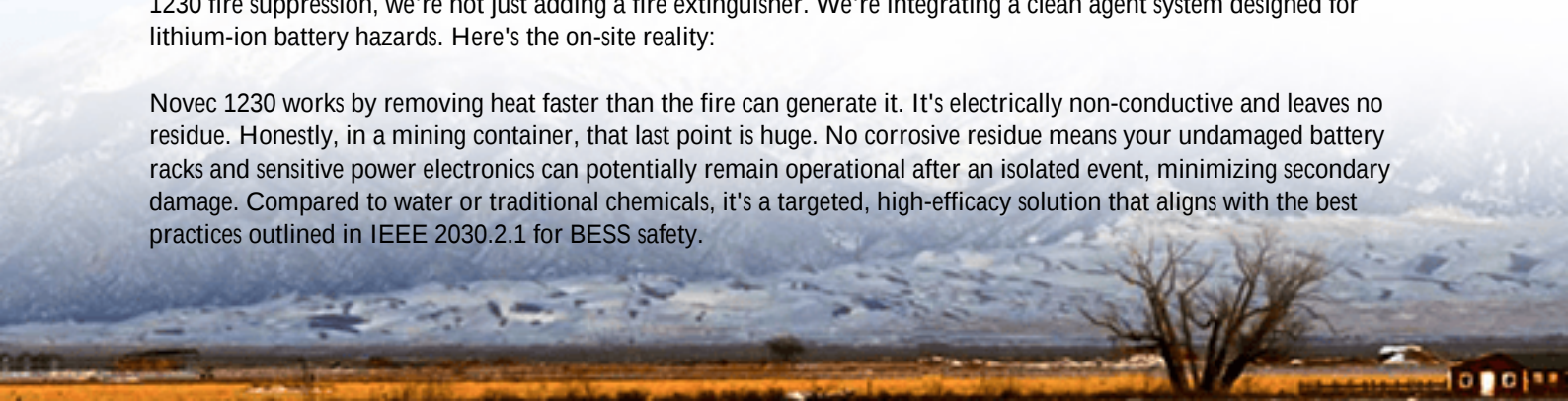
- Project Halt: I've seen sites shut down for weeks for investigation. That's not just lost production; it's contractual penalties.

Let me give you a slice of real life. We worked on a deployment for a critical power backup system at an industrial processing plant in Nevada, USA C similar environmental stresses to a mining site. The challenge was ensuring 99.99% uptime in a high-dust, high-ambient-temperature area. The client initially balked at the premium for a UL 9540A-tested system with integrated Novec.

What changed their mind? The math on LCOE (Levelized Cost of Energy). By factoring in not just the hardware but the reduced insurance costs, the elimination of a need for a separate fire-fighting water infrastructure, and the preservation of asset longevity through superior thermal management, the TCO was actually lower over the 10-year project life. The system's ability to maintain optimal C-rate performance without derating in the desert heat, thanks to its climate control working in tandem with the safety system, was the clincher. It wasn't a cost; it was an optimization.
